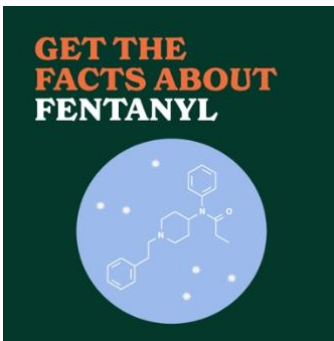




Social media graphics and captions

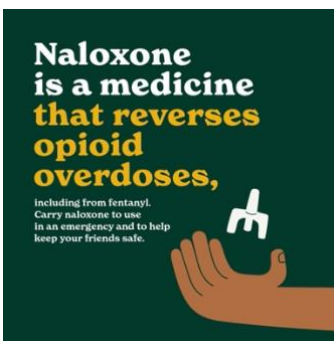


CAPTION:

In Washington and across the U.S., illicit fentanyl is creating a drug supply that's increasingly harmful and unpredictable. But knowing the facts about fentanyl can help us keep each other safe:

- Fentanyl is a powerful, fast-acting opioid used to manage pain.
- Regulated (legal) fentanyl is used in medical settings.
- Unregulated (illicit) fentanyl is sold as pills that look like real prescription medication, including OxyContin, Adderall, Percocet, or Xanax.
- It is also sold as a powder or mixed into powdered drugs like cocaine or MDMA.
- Illicit fentanyl is unpredictable. Any amount can be enough to cause overdose or death.

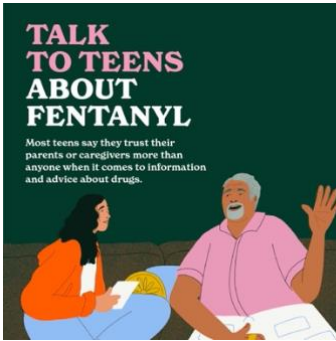

Carrying naloxone is something we all can do to help end the overdose crisis. Naloxone, also known as Narcan, is a medication that reverses opioid overdoses, including those from fentanyl. It is available most commonly as a nasal spray. You don't need any special training to get, carry, and use naloxone. In fact, you can purchase it over the counter at most pharmacies.

Most teens say they trust their parents or caregivers more than anyone when it comes to information and advice about drugs.
